



Hospital beds


Total beds occupied by confirmed COVID-19 patients per day in the county of Dorset



Apply for the Youth Covid-19 Support Fund

Apply for funding for your grassroots or national youth organisation affected by the Covid-19 pandemic he £16.5 million Youth Covid-19 Support Fund, which was announced in November 2020, is open to grassroots youth clubs, uniformed youth groups, and national youth and umbrella organisations, to help to mitigate the impact of lost income during the winter period due to the coronavirus pandemic, and ensure services providing vital support can remain open. The funding has been allocated from the £750 million charities support package and £1.7m of the £16.5m has been allocated to vital youth work qualifications and training.

Applications for the Youth Covid-19 Support Fund opened on the 15th of January, at 3pm. Applications to the Fund will be open for four weeks, and will close at 5pm on the **12th February 2021**.

Tech for Good Build 2021

Comic Relief with Paul Hamlyn Foundation will launch the next round of their joint UK Tech for Good funding programme in January 2021. This is the final round of funding in our 3-year Tech for Good partnership.

The Tech for Good programme was developed in response to the need for charities to use technology to explore different approaches to delivering better services.

The COVID-19 crisis has since increased the need for organisations to explore how digital and design approaches can be used to create more impact for the people they work with.

Application deadline: none – applications may be made at any time in writing

The Percy Bilton Charity UK

Grants are made to organisations and individuals in need throughout the U.K.

Social workers may apply on the behalf of individuals who have a disability or mental health problem, or who are over 65, for grants to purchase basic furniture, equipment and clothing.

Organisation that may apply should be a registered charity in the U.K. whose primary objectives are to assist one or more of the following groups:

- Disadvantaged/underprivileged young people (persons under 25)
- People with disabilities (physical or learning disabilities or mental health problems)
- Older people (aged over 60)

Can apply at any time.

The Smart Energy GB in Communities fund

Opened today for applications, offering grants of between £7,500-£10,000, and £15,000-£25,0000. The bid fund is being coordinated by the charity National Energy Action (NEA).

The grant programme, which is in its sixth round, works with charities and voluntary groups to ensure that people can be informed and inspired about smart meters and the benefits they can bring. This year grant funding is being targeted to organisations who reach people who are either on a low income or are offline.

Grants will be awarded to regionally-based organisations, with local networks, that have a trusted voice amongst people who are:

- on a low income (annual household income of less than £14,000 before tax), with the total amount of grant requested being between £7,500 and £10,000
- are offline (adults who have no personal internet access anywhere, inside and outside home, including via mobile devices), with the total amount of grant requested being between £15,000 and £25,000

Housing associations, registered charities and non-registered community groups are eligible to apply. Applications are also welcome from former applicants, both successful and unsuccessful.

Applications are now open must be submitted by 12 noon **Friday 12th February**. Project delivery will commence from 1st April 2021. The application form and accompanying materials are available to view on NEA's website here.

National Lottery Community Fund Re-Opens Regular Funding Programmes for England

After being paused due to the coronavirus crisis, the National Lottery Awards for All, Reaching Communities, and Partnerships funding programmes are open for applications again.

The following regular funding programmes for England have re-opened for applications:

- National Lottery Awards for All
- Reaching Communities
- Partnerships

The aim of the programmes is to support communities to thrive by funding activities that:

- Build strong relationships in and across communities.
- Improve the places and spaces that matter to communities.
- Help more people to reach their potential, by supporting them at the earliest possible stage.

Organisations can apply for funding to:

- Continue to deliver activity whether the community needs crisis response, recovery or business as usual activity.
- Change and adapt, becoming more resilient to respond to new and future challenges.

The Community Fund emphasised that it will continue to support people and communities that are most adversely impacted by the crisis and will be flexible and responsive to the needs of communities and the organisations supporting them.

Applications for all three programmes are accepted on an ongoing basis.



<u>THE SCHRODER CHARITY TRUST</u> – One-off project grants up to £5,000 for UK registered charities supporting the armed forces, the arts, communities, culture, education, the environment, health, heritage, international development and young people.

<u>THE ESMEE FAIRBAIRN FOUNDATION MAIN GRANTS PROGRAMME</u> - Grants from £30,000 with no maximum amount for 3 years or more for UK organisations that meet the Foundation's new grant-making priorities of improving the natural world, securing a fairer future, and strengthening the bonds in communities.

<u>COMIC RELIEF CAPACITY BUILDING GRANTS</u> - Grants up to £1,000 for small local grassroots organisations in England to become more resilient and improve their ability to deliver local projects.

<u>THE BATCHWORTH TRUST</u> – Grants of between £5,000 and £45,000 for UK registered charities working in the UK and overseas for a wide range of charitable causes, but in particular for charities working in the areas if medical research, social welfare and support for young people.

<u>THE CAYO FOUNDATION</u> – Small and large grants for UK registered charities for a wide range of charitable causes.

THE MATTHEW GOOD FOUNDATION "GRANTS FOR GOOD" - Grants up to £3,500 for small UK charities, community and voluntary groups and social enterprises with an annual turnover of under £50,000 that have a positive impact on communities, people and the environment.
